LOSD Communication: Cases of COVID-19 at: Lakeridge High School Date: 4/22/21

Today, we were notified that a person at Lakeridge High School has tested positive for COVID-19. This was verified by Clackamas County on 4/22/21. The person was last at the school on 04/19/2021 and 04/20/2021.

As members of the school community, we understand that this might raise concerns alongside a caring response. We are working closely with Clackamas County Public Health to respond to this news.

Each situation calls for different protocols. In this case, we are taking the following steps:

- 1. We are currently working on lists of the identified close contacts of the positive COVID-19 case. If you have been identified as a close contact, you will be contacted by Clackamas County. A close contact is someone who has been within 6 feet of the person who tested positive for longer than 15 cumulative minutes in a day.
- 2. The school has been following the COVID-19 guidance of 6 feet distancing, wearing face coverings, and washing/sanitizing hands. Due to this, no one in school classes has been considered a close contact.
- 3. Team sport athletes and students who ride the school bus cannot always maintain 6 foot distancing, so it is possible that they may be considered close contacts.
- 4. Building areas that may have been affected have been disinfected.

If you test positive for COVID-19, you are ISOLATED:

Isolate at home for **at least** 10 days since the test date (or since symptoms started, whichever is first), and 24 hours fever free, and COVID-19 symptoms are improving.

Student athletes will need a physician clearance to return to play.

OHA How to Isolate

If you have been identified as a close contact to someone who tested positive for COVID-19, you are QUARANTINED:

Quarantine starts from the last time you were exposed to the person who tested positive. You have 2 options in Clackamas County:

- 1. A 14-day quarantine is required for high-risk exposures in school related settings. Such settings include sports practice, games and travel, certain extracurricular activities, social gatherings, and household exposures. If you do not develop any symptoms, you would be clear (off quarantine) on day 15. For example, if you were exposed to someone who tested positive for covid-19 on April 1, your quarantine would last until April 15. You would be off quarantine on April 16.
- 2. A 10-day minimum quarantine is required for low-risk exposures in school related settings. Such settings include classrooms and buses. You should continue to monitor for symptoms during days 10-14. If you do not develop any symptoms, you would be clear (off quarantine) on day 11. For example, if you were exposed to someone who tested positive for covid-19 on April 1, your quarantine would last until April 11. You would be off quarantine on April 12. Monitor for symptoms for 4 more days.
- 3. Some counties allow people with no symptoms to test out of quarantine after 7 days. This is not an option for schools in Clackamas County.

OHA How to Quarantine

If you have the primary symptoms of COVID-19 after being exposed to someone with COVID-19: Contact your healthcare provider.

Seek COVID-19 testing.

Isolate at home for at least 10 days since symptoms started, and 24 hours fever free, and COVID-19 symptoms are improving.
